NEW MEXICO HISTORY MUSEUM

Opened in 2009 as an extension to the historic Palace, the History Museum offers spacious long-term and changing exhibits, along with a learning center and auditorium. Start your New Mexico adventure by visiting *Telling New Mexico: Stories from Then and Now*, our main exhibit.

PALACE OF THE GOVERNORS

Our largest artifact, this National Historic Treasure speaks to New Mexico's Spanish, Puebloan, Mexican and U.S. roots. Started in 1610, its thick adobe walls, ceiling vigas, and the chapel's mud floor represent the best of Spanish Pueblo Revival design.

FRAY ANGÉLICO CHÁVEZ HISTORY LIBRARY AND PALACE OF THE GOVERNORS PHOTO ARCHIVES

From serious scholars to curious browsers, the library and archives offer a wealth of information to the public, including rare books, manuscripts, maps, newspapers and more. The archives hold about 1 million images—many for sale as prints.

PALACE PRESS

Set in the courtyard in what once were stables, the Palace Press serves as an exhibit as well as active print shop, producing award-winning, limited-edition books and poetry broadsides. Be sure to see its re-creation of legendary artist Gustave Baumann's print studio.

NATIVE AMERICAN ARTISANS PROGRAM

An enduring symbol of Santa Fe, the Native American Artisans Program on the Palace's front porch helps preserve traditional arts and crafts and supports tribal economies. Meet the artists, each of whom maintains standards of tradition and authenticity.

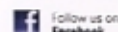

1 The Palace of the Governors

Step inside the nation's oldest continually occupied government building. Check out its architectural details. Imagine the Spanish, Mexican and territorial governors who lived here. Look for signs of the Pueblo Revolt.

2 Segesser Hides

Colonial life could be brutal. These 18th-century paintings detail battles among Spanish, French and Native peoples. Can you find the Franciscan priest?



3 Peer into the Past

In the Palace's west end, floor hatches reveal archaeology into the building's first foundations.

4 The Best Bultos

Tesoros de Devoción/Treasures of Devotion celebrates the colonists who created a unique version of religious

5 Hot off the Palace Press

Historical printing presses, antique metal type and pots of ink come to life in the Palace Press, both an exhibit and a working print shop. Read the Gutenberg way!

6 Change It Up

Pop into a series of dazzling takes on Southwest art, history and culture in the Herzstein Changing Exhibitions Galleries.

7 Look Up!

To symbolize the 1680 Pueblo Revolt, a fury of arrows dangles from the ceiling, pointed at a charred adobe wall.

8 How to Hold Billy the Kid (or not)

Find leg irons similar to what the outlaw broke free from during the Lincoln County War.

9 The Harvey Girls

Continue downstairs to discover the boldly adventuresome women at the Harvey Houses

10 47-Star Flag

Can a flag break the law? New Mexico's did after we became the nation's 47th state on January 6, 1912. See an outlaw flag recalling that event.

11 The Greatest Generation

Explore New Mexico's role in World War II and see silver dishes made by the Tiffany Company for use aboard a legendary battleship, the USS *New Mexico*. Compare different etchings on each piece.

12 What's Your Story?

"My New Mexico" tells of contemporary New Mexicans, minus one: You. Take a card and leave your memories, a picture, or a poem.
