- The cultural resources (pueblitos and rock art) that you may come across hiking out here are hundreds of years old. They are fragile and irreplaceable. Do not climb on the walls or roofs of any ruins. Do not remove artifacts from the sites. You may examine them, but leave them where you found them. Removal of artifacts is a Federal Crime and punishable by law.
- Do not touch rock art panels. The acids on your skin can damage them.
- Pack out your trash.
- Your help is needed to preserve these cultural and natural resources for future generations to enjoy. Report any vandalism to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) hot line at 505-564-7600.
